Highlights


- A survey was conducted to assess fostering perceptions and future behaviors based on foster experiences during the COVID-19 quarantine. A survey link was sent via Best Friends Animal Society Lifesaving Centers and Network Partners. A total of 321 participants responded between May 10-18, 2020.
- 43% of respondents said this was their FIRST foster experience. For many, the pandemic allowed respondents to work from home and have some extra time on their hands to foster. Most heard about the need for fosters through social media (35%) or their local shelter (27%) or rescue group (24%).
- 79% fostered through Best Friends. The largest percentage fostered cats (49%), followed by dogs (32%), kittens (27%), and puppies (7%). The large majority also had personal pets at home (62% dogs and 71% cats).
- Satisfaction of the foster experience was extremely high, with 75% extremely satisfied and 20% satisfied.
- While 58% say they are unlikely to adopt the animal they are currently fostering, nearly all (95%) have already facilitated the adoption of their foster pet or are comfortable working directly with prospective adopters to do so.
- 80% believe the greatest impact of fostering shelter/rescue animals is the ability to expand a shelter or rescue's capacity to save the lives of homeless pets.
- 90% believe the definition of a successful foster is fostering until the animal is adopted by someone else.
- 82% said they are likely to continue fostering one or more shelter/rescue animals within a year after their community "re-opens". 71% said in the future they would be interested in fostering until the animal is adopted.

These unprecedented times of a pandemic and social distancing has a silver lining when it comes to fostering. With more time at home, many have been able to foster for the first time and they have been extremely satisfied with their experience. These new and existing foster families believe their foster work expands the capacity of shelter and rescued to save more homeless pets. Even though most aren't planning to adopt the animal they are fostering, they are very comfortable helping to facilitate the adoption process (many have already done so). Most say they will continue fostering even when their community "re-opens" and they believe that a success foster is fostering until the animal is adopted by someone else.



Most heard about the need for foster care from **social media** and their **local shelter / rescue group**

Q: How did you learn about the need for people to provide foster care for shelter/rescue animals during the COVID-19 pandemic? (check all that apply)



What do you need from your local shelter/rescue to be successful as a foster for the organization?




- Good communication!

...nearly all (95%) have already facilitated the adoption of their foster pet or are comfortable working directly with prospective adopters to do so.






Future Considerations
